CHAPTER VII

ACTION WITH RESPECT TO THEFATS TO THE PRACE, END ACTS AGGRESSION

'RT CLE 39

The Scourity Council shall determine the existence of any threat to the pance, breach of the pance, or net of aggressien and shall make recommendations, or decide what measures shall be taken in accordance with inticles 41 and 42, to maintain or restore international pance and security.

ARTICLE AO

In order to prevent an aggrevation of the situation, the Security Council may, before making the recommendations or deciding upon the measures provided for in Article 39, call upon the parties concerned to comply with such provisional measures as it does necessary or desirable. Such provisional measures shall be tithout projudice to the rights, claims, or resition of the parties concerned. The Security Council shall duly take resount of failure to comply with such provisional measures.

ART TOLE 41

The Security Council may decide what measures not involving the use of armed ferce are to be employed to give effect to its decisions, and it may call upon the Members of the United Nations to apply such measures. These may include complete or partial interruption of economic relations and of rail, see, air, postal, telegraphic, radio, and other means of communication, and the severance of diplomatic relations.

ART JULE 42

Should the Sourity Council consider that measures provided for in Article 41 would be inadequate or a we proved to be inadequate, it may take such action by fir, sea, or land forces as may be necessary to maintain or restore intermational parce and socurity. Such action may include demonstrations, blockade, and other operations by air, sea, or land forces of Members of the United Nations.

ART TOLE 42

- J. All M mbors of the United Nations, in order to contribute to the maintenance of interactional prace and security, undertake to make available to the Security Council, on its call and in accordance with a special agreement or agreements, aread forces, assistance, and facilities, including rights of pass go, accessary for the purpose of maintaining international poace and security.
- 2. Such agreement or agreements shall govern the numbers and types of forces, their degree of readiness and general location, and the nature of the field ties and assistance to be provided.
- 3. The promont or agreements shall be negotiated his Acon as 1008 ible (07104e) on the initiative of the Security Council. They shall be concluded between the Security Council and Manbars or active the Security Council and groups of Members and shall be subject to ratification by the signatury states in necordance with their respective constitutional processes.

Security Council, any other state, whether a Member of the Unfited Nations ow not, which finds itself confronted with special economic problems arising from the carrying out of those measures shall have the right to consult the Security Council with regard to a solution of those problems.

Article 51

Nothing in the present Chatter shall impair the inherent right of individual or collective self-defense if an armed attack occurs against a Me mber of the United Nations, until the Security Council has taken the measures necessary to maintain international seace and security. Measures taken by Members in the exercise of this right of selfdefense shall be immediately reported to the Security council and shall not in any way affect the authority and reponsibility of the Security Council under the present Charter to take at any time such action as it deems necessary in order to maintain or restore international peace and security.
