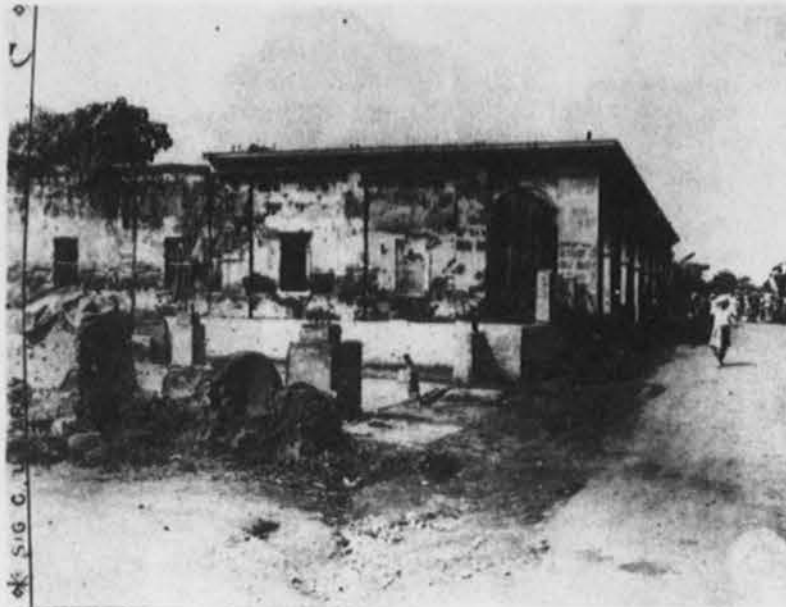

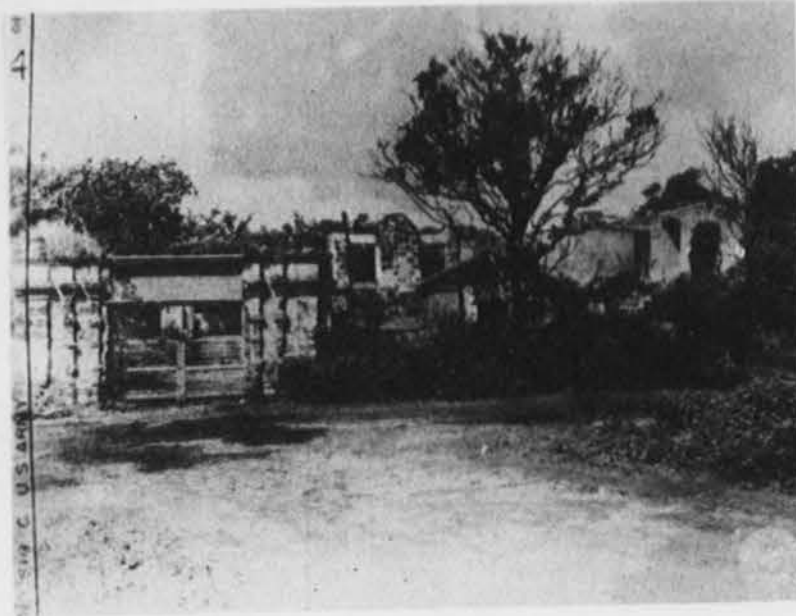

SIMEONA YU, after having been duly sworn, testified at the Municipal Building, Real Street, Santo Tomas, Batangas Province, P.I., on 21 September 1945, as follows:

Q What is your full name?  
A Mrs. Simeona Yu.

Q What is your age?  
A 37.

Q What is your present address?  
A Barrio San Roque, Santo Tomas, Batangas Province.

Q Do you intend to move, and if so, is there anybody who will always know your whereabouts?  
A I plan to go to Manila sometime this week. My address in Manila is corner Oroquieta and Blumentritt Streets. Anyway I will leave my exact and up-to-date address with my mother, Julia Castillo, of Santo Tomas, in case I leave.

Q Did you suffer any mistreatment at the hands of the Japanese?  
A Yes.

Q Please tell us in your own words exactly what happened.  
A Very early in the morning of February 11th, 1945, my husband, my daughter, my aunt and I were awakened by loud knocking at our door in Barrio San Roque. My aunt opened the door and found there were Japanese soldiers knocking at the door with their bayonets. They ordered us to come down. When we came down, they marched the four of us to another house where we were incarcerated. Our hands were tied behind our backs and we were blindfolded.

Later on we were led to a dugout near the house. We were stabbed by bayonets. After the Japs stabbed us we were thrown into the dugout and then covered with earth and coconut palms. I lost consciousness. When I regained my senses I saw light coming through small slits of the coconut palms. Guided by this light I bored my way up slowly through the pile of bodies and made my way home.

Q Tell us the names and ages of your husband, your daughter and your aunt.

A My husband, Feliciano Lican, 42; my daughter, Florencia Lican, 14; my aunt, Jacinta Pascua, 55. They were all Filipinos and resided at Barrio San Roque, Santo Tomas, Batangas.

Q How many Japanese first came into your house?  
A Five.

Q To whose house were you taken and how far was it from your home?

A To the house of Mateo Tolentino which was about half a block north of our home.

Q Did you find others in the house of Mateo Tolentino when you arrived there?

A Yes. We found nine people there; they were all kneeling. They were: Juana Molino, 65; Maximina Robles, 28; Purificacion Oliva, 4; Rolando Oliva, 7; the others I don't remember their names, but all were Filipinos and residents of

Barrio San Roque, Santo Tomas, Batangas.

We were ordered to kneel down and our hands were tied behind our back. Then the Japanese asked us where the guerrillas were. We told them we did not know anything about guerrillas. We were then told to wait. Then they took away 3 men and I never saw them again. My husband and I were then taken to the dugout, blindfolded, bayoneted and thrown into the dugout. I lost consciousness. When I recovered I saw the bodies of the other six persons sprawled on top of me. I climbed from under the pile of bodies and made my escape. I was the only survivor.

Q Did you recover any of the bodies and bury them?  
A All the bodies are still in the dugout.

Q How many Japanese did you see altogether?  
A Only five.

Q What branch of service did they belong?  
A I do not know.

Q Can you describe the uniform they wore?  
A They wore dark green uniforms.

Q Did you notice any anchors on their caps?  
A They had tiny Japanese flags on their caps and they wore red muffers.

Q Did you hear anything that might give a clue to their names?  
A No.

Q Did you or any of the others give the Japanese any cause for this mistreatment?  
A I do not know of anything that we did to provoke the Japanese into these horrible murders.

Q In what language did the Japanese speak?  
A The Japanese officer could understand a little Tagalog.

Q How do you know he was an officer?  
A He had a saber and a pistol.

Q Can you describe this officer?  
A No.

Q Would you be able to identify him if we bring him to you?  
A No.

Q What injuries did you receive?  
A Seven bayonet wounds: one on my breast between the nipples, one below the left nipple, one above the left nipple, one on the left side of the left nipple, one on the left breast and one on the right armpit and on the back.

Q Is there anything further you wish to tell us?  
A Nothing more.

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MAXIMO M. MALVAR, after having been duly sworn, testified at the Municipal Building on Real Street, Santo Tomas, Batangas, Province, P.I., on 6 October 1945, as follows:

Q Please state your full name, age, address and nationality.  
A Maximo M. Malvar, 49 years of age, resident of Santo Tomas, Batangas Province, Filipino.

Q Do you intend to remain at your present address, and if not, how can your whereabouts in the future be ascertained?  
A I intend to remain in Santo Tomas.

Q What is your present occupation?  
A Agriculturist.

Q What was your occupation during the Japanese occupation?  
A I was acting as Provincial Governor of Batangas.

Q What can you tell about the disposition and the make-up of the Japanese forces in this area during the Japanese occupation?  
A During that time there were three units of Japanese forces stationed here, namely, the garrison, the Kempei-tai of Lipa and the Kempei-tai (Japanese Military Police) of San Pablo, Laguna. Members of the garrison stayed here for only a short time and went to some unknown destination. The Military Police of Lipa and San Pablo were under the Kempei-tai Headquarters stationed in San Pablo, Laguna. Colonel Hibi and his executive officer, Captain Okuda, were in charge of this organization.

The "zoning" system was effected by Colonel Hibi, whereby information is extracted from the inhabitants by gathering the people in a plaza and made to stay for several days without food.

On February 2, 1945, my servant informed me that some of the members of the Military Police went to our house and asked for me. I was not at home at that time and my servant told them that I was in Manila. When the Japanese learned that I was not in my home, they left. The people of the town, upon learning that I was not in my home, became alarmed and they began evacuating their homes. Some went to the mountains, others to the bank of the river, thinking that these places were the safest.

Q Can you describe each one of the Japanese officers you have mentioned?  
A Yes, sir.

Q Describe to us Colonel Hibi.  
A Colonel Hibi was about 5 feet 4 inches in height, medium build, weighed about 130 pounds and approximately 39 years of age. His hair was black and short. He had no scars or marks on his face, his teeth was normal and he wore no glasses. He appeared to be an educated person and he was dressed neatly. He did not speak either English or Tagalog.

Q How about Captain Okuda?  
A Captain Okuda, reputed to be the worst of all the officers ever stationed in this place, measured about 5 feet 8 inches in height, weighed about 160 pounds, and his age was about

42 years. His hair was black, shaven; his complexion was yellow and he had the typical Japanese slanting eyes. He wore no glasses. Q Would you be able to identify these officers if you saw them again?

MARCELINA ENDAYA, after having been duly sworn, testified at the Municipal Building of Santo Tomas, Batangas, P.I., on 21 September 1945 as follows:

Q What is your full name?

A Marcelina Endaya.

Q What is your age?

A I am 28 years old.

Q What is your nationality?

A Filipino.

Q Do you intend to remain at your present address?

A Yes. I do not expect nor desire to go away.

Q Did you suffer any mistreatment at the hands of the Japanese?

A Yes.

Q Did you see other people mistreated by the Japanese on or about the 11th of February 1945?

A Yes.

Q Please tell us in your own words what you saw in the way of mistreatment of Filipino civilians by the Japanese.  
A On Sunday morning, 11 February 1945, while we were hiding near the house of Tiburcio Cumba, west of San Juan River, Santo Tomas, we saw six Japanese soldiers. They saw us too and ordered us to come out of our hiding place. Then they tied our hands, the left hand, with a rope in the manner of a chain gang. The first ones who were caught by the Japs were led to a place about 120 meters north of the house of Tiburcio Cumba. We too were marched to that place, where our left hands were loosened from the rope that tied us. I was bayoneted about 4 times in the back, and 3 times in front. The last thrust went through my right wrist to the body of my 5 months old son, Reynaldo and killed him.

When we were all stabbed, we were thrown into one pile and gasoline was poured on us. The Japs also gathered dry sticks and piled them on tops of our bodies and then set us on fire. When my hair was being burned, such was the pain that I put my hands to my throat and tried to choke myself and end it all. But this was of no avail, so I jumped from the burning pile. There were still Japanese soldiers around so I pretended to be dead. They did not see me. When they went away, I got up and went to the house of Tiburcio Cumba. About 8 o'clock in the evening, my mother and sister found me in that house.

Q Who were these "we" that you refer to?

A The 24 persons hiding near the house of Tiburcio Cumba, 2 men and 22 women and children, including myself.

Q When you arrived at the place of the killing, were there any people there?

A Yes, there were other people there when we arrived, and together with our group, numbered about 50 people in all.

Q How many Japanese soldiers participated in the killing?

A I saw only one doing the killing and also another one untying the rope of those victims to be stabbed.

A This is the place where we were attacked north of the house of Tiburcio Cumba, and these are the remains of the persons killed there.

Q Is there anything further that you wish to tell us?

A I think that is all.

AGRIPINO CALABIA, after having been duly sworn, testified at the New Bilibid Prisons, Muntinglupa, Rizal Province, P.I. on 18 October 1945, as follows:

Q Please state your full name, age, address and nationality.

A Agripino Calabia, 33 years of age, resident of San Pablo City, P.I., Filipino.

Q What was your occupation before you were taken to this prison?

A Nursery man.

Q How long do you think you will remain here?

A I do not know. I am detained for collaboration but no formal accusation has yet been filed against me.

Q Where did you reside during the Japanese occupation?

A In San Pablo City.

Q Where were you from the 9th to the 14th of February 1945?

A From January till March 6, 1945, I stayed in San Pablo City.

Q During those dates in question, did you accompany the Japanese to Tanauan and Santo Tomas, Batangas?

A No, sir. I stayed all the time in San Pablo City.

Q Did you know that the Japanese went to the towns of Lipa, Tanauan and Santo Tomas to burn them and massacre thousand of Filipino civilians?

A I know nothing about that because I was then in San Pablo City until March 6, 1945, when I was brought to the mountains.

Q Were you working for the Japanese in San Pablo City?

A Yes, sir. My work concerned with food supply and in this work the Japanese trusted me. I worked for them since December 15, 1944.

Q Were you ever mistreated by the Japanese?

A Personally I was not mistreated.

Q Do you know the name of the company or unit to which the Japanese you worked for belonged?

A I do not know, sir. I only know personally the Kempei-tai officials in San Pablo City.

Q Would you be able to recognize these officials if you saw them again?

A Yes, sir.

Q Are those the only Japanese you know?

A Yes, sir.

Q Did you ever see any mistreatment of Filipino civilians by the Japanese in San Pablo City or elsewhere?

A I have never seen a Filipino killed by the Japanese for I was always staying home. Besides, if the Japanese ever went around to mistreat them, the Japanese never brought me along with them.

Q Tell us the names of the Japanese officials that you know from San Pablo City.

A Major UNO. He arrived in San Pablo City in December 1944

stayed until March 1945. Capt. YAMAGUCHI was the Chief of the Kempei-tai (Japanese Military Police) in San Pablo City. Sgt. Major ODAKI, Jui was Assistant to Capt. YAMAGUCHI. First Sgt. UBAI was next in command of ODAKI. I also know Sgt. SAKUDAKI, Sgt. UIHARA, Sgt. KAWAKAMI, and Sgt. HIROSI.

I do not know the first names of any of those I have mentioned except in the case of ODAKI.

Q Did you know any Kempei officer in Lipa, Batangas?

A I know one because I met him in the mountains. He was Capt. YAGI. I do not know his first name.

Q Can you give us a personal description of those Japanese you have mentioned?

A Yes, sir.

Q Could you identify each of those Japanese if they were brought before you?

A Yes, sir.

Q Will you describe to us Capt. YAMAGUCHI?

A YAMAGUCHI was about 5 feet 3 inches in height, weighed approximately 145 lbs. very stocky and heavy built. His hair was black but very sparse with marked tendency to baldness. His complexion was light yellow with red spots or patches on his face. His eyes were black and slightly slanting; he wore no glasses. He was about 45 years old, had very military bearing and looked like a Filipino, except that his manner of standing and walking was typical Japanese. He had no scars or marks on his body save those red spots on his face. His teeth were bigger than normal. He was always dressed in civilian clothes and he wore short pants. His moustache was not very thick, the hairs were fine and well trimmed. He appeared to be an educated person.

Q Describe Sgt. Major ODAKI, Jui.

A ODAKI, Jui had a height of about 5 feet 9 inches, weighed not less than 120 lbs, and slender built. His black hair was long and well combed with pomade. His complexion was light yellow. His eyes were black and not slanting and he did not wear glasses. He was about 30 years old and he had effeminate tendencies. He had no visible marks or scars; his teeth were normal and he had no moustache. He was always in uniform but he was a sloppy dresser. I can also say that he was an educated person.

Q Describe 1st Sgt. UBAI.

A UBAI was 5 feet inches tall, weighed about 110 lbs and was slender built. His hair was black, kept long and well combed with pomade, the 'alfonsino' style. His complexion was brown like a Filipino. His eyes were black, not very slanting and he wore no glasses. I think he was between the ages of 33 and 35 years. He had very military appearance; he had no visible scars or marks, nor did he have a moustache. He had two gold teeth on the upper set. He always wore a coat uniform and boots. All of these men I describe wore swords. This man was an educated person.

Q Describe Sgt. SAKUDAKI.

A SAKUDAKI was 5 feet 5 inches tall, but his body was much bigger and more muscular than UBAI. He probably weighed 150 lbs. His hair was black but he was always shaved. His

stayed until March 1945. Capt. YAMAGUCHI was the Chief of the Kempei-tai (Japanese Military Police) in San Pablo City. Sgt. Major ODAKI, Jui was Assistant to Capt. YAMAGUCHI. First Sgt. UBAI was next in command of ODAKI. I also know Sgt. SAKUDAKI, Sgt. UIHARA, Sgt. KAWAKAMI, and Sgt. HIROSI.

I do not know the first names of any of those I have mentioned except in the case of ODAKI.

Q Did you know any Kempei officer in Lipa, Batangas?

A I know one because I met him in the mountains. He was Capt. YAGI. I do not know his first name.

Q Can you give us a personal description of those Japanese you have mentioned?

A Yes, sir.

Q Could you identify each of those Japanese if they were brought before you?

Q Will you describe to us Capt. YAMAGUCHI?

He was about 45 years old, had very military bearing and looked like a Filipino, except that his manner of standing and walking was typical Japanese. His moustache was not very thick, the hairs were fine and well trimmed. He appeared to be an educated person.

Q Describe Sgt. Major ODAKI, Jui.

A ODAKI, Jui had a height of about 5 feet 9 inches, weighed not less than 120 lbs, and slender built. His black hair was long and well combed with pomade. His complexion was light yellow. His eyes were black and not slanting and he did not wear glasses. He was about 30 years old and he had effeminate tendencies. He had no visible marks or scars; his teeth were normal and he had no moustache. He was always in uniform but he was a sloppy dresser. I can also say that he was an educated person.

Q Describe 1st Sgt. UBAI.

A UBAI was 5 feet inches tall, weighed about 110 lbs and was slender built. His hair was black, kept long and well combed with pomade, the 'alfonsino' style. His complexion was brown like a Filipino. His eyes were black, not very slanting and he wore no glasses. I think he was between the ages of 33 and 35 years. He had very military appearance; he had no visible scars or marks, nor did he have a moustache. He had two gold teeth on the upper set. He always wore a coat uniform and boots. All of these men I describe wore swords. This man was an educated person.

Q Describe Sgt. SAKUDAKI.

A SAKUDAKI was 5 feet 5 inches tall, but his body was much bigger and more muscular than UBAI. He probably weighed 150 lbs. His hair was black but he was always shaved. His

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complexion was brown like a Filipino. His eyes were black and he did not wear glasses. He was about 35 years old, walked like the ordinary bow-legged Japanese, though he had military bearing. He had a scar on the lower jaw. He had no moustache. He had a gold tooth but I do not exactly remember if he had more than one gold tooth; all I know he had gold tooth on the upper set towards the side. He was always in civilian clothes but he was very sloppy dresser. I think he was an educated person. One striking feature of his was his jaw which grew very thick beard which was always clean shaven. He's what we call a "Barbon."

Q How about Sgt. WIHARA?

A WIHARA was a short fellow, about 5 feet 2 inches in height; weighed about 120 lbs, heavy built, round body. He always combed his long black hair neatly with pomade. His complexion was light yellow; his eyes were black and very slanting and he wore glasses occasionally, not always. He was about 29 or 30 years old, typically bow-legged. He had no scars or marks, no moustache, and his teeth were normal. He was a very sloppy dresser but I think he was an educated person, being a graduate of a military school. I remember that he was somewhat a hunchback.

Q What do you say of Sgt. KAWAKAMI?

A KAWAKAMI was 5 feet 5 inches in height, weighed about 130 lbs, medium built, stout and round body. He had long black hair which was well combed with pomade. His complexion was brown like a Filipino. His eyes were black and not slanting; he wore no glasses. He was about 30 years old, had very military appearance and he walked with straight posture. In all respect he looked like a Filipino and he was the only MP officer who spoke Tagalog very well. He had no scars or marks, his skin was very smooth. He had one gold tooth, upper set, on the side. He had no moustache. He was an educated person.

Q Describe Sgt. HIROSI.

A HIROSI was 5 feet 4 inches tall, weighed about 140 lbs, and was heavy built, very stocky and stout. His head was shaved at all times. His complexion was light yellow. His eyes were black and he wore no glasses. He was about 30 years old, had very military bearing and was always very smartly dressed in uniform. He had no scars or marks, no moustache, and his teeth were normal. He seemed to be an educated person.

Q How about Major UNO?

A Major UNO was about 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighed about 120 lbs and was slender built. He was bald headed, the remaining hair of his head was always shaved. He had the real Japanese light yellow complexion. His eyes were black and very slanting and he wore no glasses. I think he was between 35 and 40 years old. He had effeminate mannerism. He had no scars or marks; his skin was quite smooth. He had no moustache and his teeth were normal. He was an educated person. His jaw grew very thick beard but was always clean shaven.

Q Who do you think gave the order to massacre the people in Batangas?

A I believe it was Major UNO.

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complexion was brown like a Filipino. His eyes were black and he did not wear glasses. He was about 35 years old, walked like the ordinary bow-legged Japanese, though he had military bearing. He had a scar on the lower jaw. He had no moustache. He had a gold tooth but I do not exactly remember if he had more than one gold tooth; all I know he had gold tooth on the upper set towards the side. He was always in civilian clothes but he was very sloppy dresser. I think he was an educated person. One striking feature of his was his jaw which grew very thick beard which was always clean shaven. He's what we call a "Barbon."

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Q How about Major UNO?

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Q Who do you think gave the order to massacre the people in Batangas?

A I believe it was Major UNO.

R E S T R I C T E D

Q Why do you think so?

A I know it because other Kempei-tai officers told me that Major UNO was in charge of Laguna, Tayabas and Batangas provinces. His power as garrison commander of the regular army was more extensive.

Q Do you know a person named Bautista? Could you tell us his first name?

A I do not know him.

Q Can you give us some more information which might help us find out the Japanese who were responsible for the massacre of civilians in Batangas?

A I know another Japanese, an MP from Lipa, Batangas. He was Capt. YAGI. I met him in the mountains.

Q Will you describe Capt. YAGI?

A Capt. YAGI was about 5 feet 7 inches tall, weighed about 125 lbs, and was slender built. His head was always shaved. His complexion was light yellow. His eyes were black and a little slanting. He wore no glasses. He was about 35 years old. His teeth were normal. He had no moustache, no scars or marks. His thick beard was always neat shaven. He had very military bearing and I should say he was an educated person.

Q Do you know YAGI'S first name?

A No, sir. I only met him in the mountains.

Q Could identify him if he were brought before you?

A Yes, sir.

Q Do you have anything further to add to your statement?

A No.

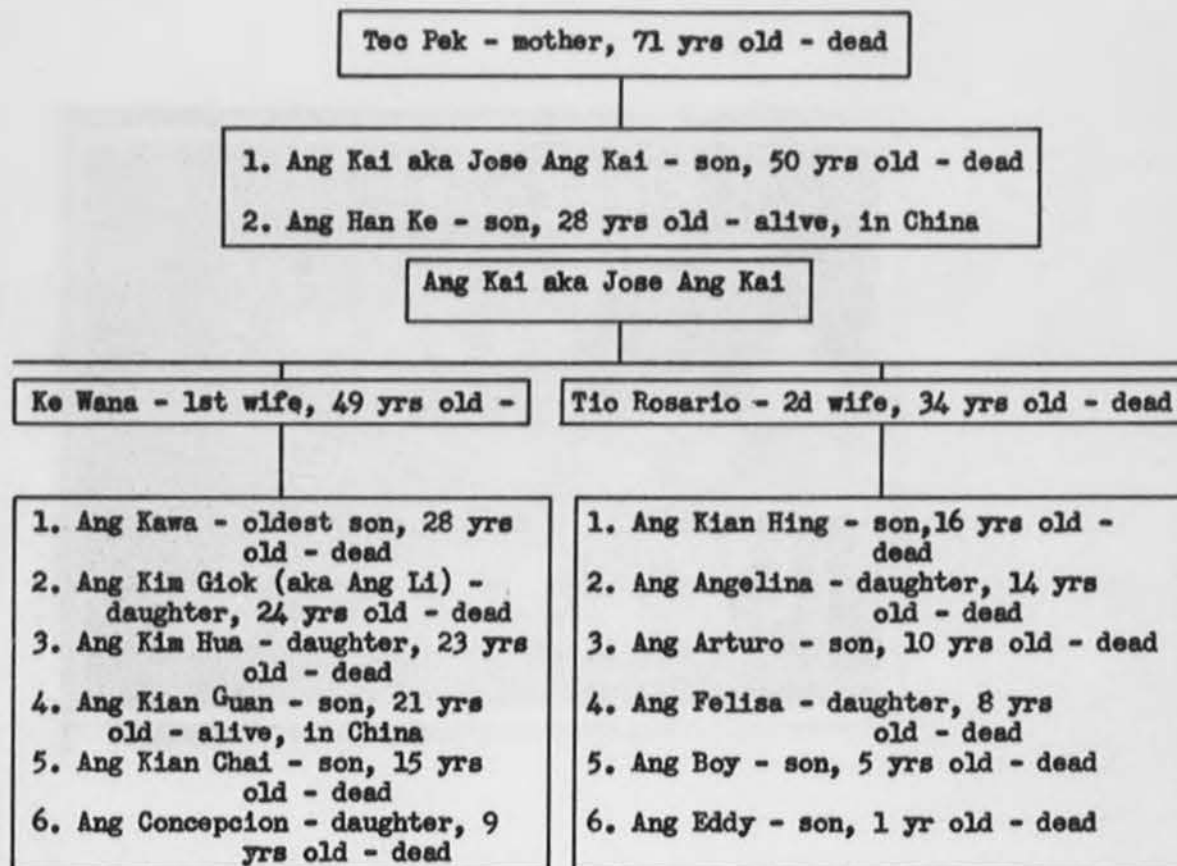

EDWARD O'BRIEN, after having been duly sworn, testified at Headquarters, 103d Infantry Regiment, U.S. Army, Cabanatuan, Nueva Ecija, P. I., on 1 September 1945 as follows:

- Q Please state your name, age, rank, serial number and permanent home address.  
A Edward O'BRIEN, Technical Sergeant, 34789885. My permanent home address is 1311 Bristow Street, New York City, New York. I am 25 years old.
- Q What is your connection with 103d Infantry Regiment?  
A I am stationed with the 103d Infantry Regiment.
- Q In what capacity?  
A As specialist of the CIC from the 43d Division.
- Q During the time that you have been operating in that capacity, have you seen any evidence of atrocities committed by the Japanese?  
A Yes, I have. It was on the 9th of April, 1945.
- Q Can you tell us where it was?  
A It happened in Pakil, Laguna Province.
- Q Will you please state in detail what you saw there?  
A In the area I saw approximately thirty-two bodies. Most of them were bayoneted five or six times. There was one group that I saw in a mudhole of a passing stream. There were about fifteen in that group. Then we found bodies in groups of two or three dispersed all over the area off the trails that led down to the barrios.
- Q Did you see any evidence of cannibalism?  
A Yes. I saw the body of a little boy about four years old. The meat of the upper left thigh of the leg of the boy had been sliced as if cut by a bayonet or a sharp knife.
- Q Did you see any evidence of decapitation?  
A No, sir.
- Q Did you find any of the survivors?  
A At the scene there were no survivors but later investigation revealed that there were some survivors in the 1st Portable Surgical Hospital which was located outside the town of Mabitac, Province of Laguna.
- Q Can you tell me the names of the survivors, sex, nationality and approximate ages?  
A AURORA VALENCIA, female, Filipino, 16 years old, and a native of Pingas, Laguna Bay, Luzon, P. I.; MATEO ADES, male, Filipino, 70 years of age, and a native of Pingas, Laguna Bay, Luzon, P. I.; PATRICIO ADAO (who, I learned later, died as a result of a bayonet wounds), male, Filipino, 9 years old, and a native of Pingas, Laguna Bay, Luzon, P.I.
- Q Were you able to take down the statements of the above-mentioned survivors?  
A Yes.

- Q When did the atrocities occur according to their statements?
- A Approximately 7 April 1945, at about ten o'clock in the morning.
- Q Did they state any reason why the Japanese committed such atrocities?
- A No. In fact, they said that there was no resistance offered by the civilians. They seemed to think that the Japanese were given orders to kill them.
- Q Did these survivors witness the commission of the atrocities by the Japanese?
- A From the affidavits taken from them, they witnessed the Filipino civilians being bayoneted by the Japanese in isolated places so that the bodies of the persons we found were scattered all around the area. There was one affidavit taken from a boy, whose name I do not recall, who said that although he did not see all of the victims being bayoneted by the Japanese, yet he could deduce the killing from the moans and cries of the people that were there.
- Q Do you know the Japanese Unit that was responsible for these atrocities?
- A Affidavits taken from the survivors indicated that the commanding officer of the group was the former commander of the Japanese Army garrison in the town of Paete, Laguna.
- Q Do you know what Japanese Units were in the town of Paete, Province of Laguna?
- A Offhand I don't.
- Q What Japanese Units was in your sector at that particular time which was opposing your group?
- A I don't recall, but I believe that can be checked with headquarters or somewhere.
- Q Did you see any victims whose hands were tied behind them?
- A Yes, sir, there was one.
- Q Do you know the name of the person whose hands were tied behind him?
- A I don't know but it can be found in the Atrocities Investigation Report I wrote on 11 April 1945 which went directly thru CIC channels.
- Q Who was with you when these victims were discovered?
- A T/5 John J JEPSON was with me. He was a member of the 161st Signal Company attached to the 43d Division.
- Q Was there anyone else with you aside from T/5 JEPSON?
- A Yes, a Filipino guerrilla by the name of Felix ASTRONIMO. He was one of the survivors of the atrocities.
- Q Do you know the present whereabouts of Felix ASTRONIMO?
- A He was working with the units of the Division there. His family, wife and children, were victims of the said atrocities. I don't know his present address but I believe you can find him in the town of Paete, Laguna.

R E S T R I C T E D

- Q What outfit or unit actually discovered these bodies?  
A Company L of the 103d Infantry Regiment. They were members of the security patrol. They left the base camp in the afternoon of 7 April 1945. They brought down the survivors I had just mentioned, namely, AURORA VALENCIA, MATEO ADES AND PATRICIO ADAO.
- Q Do you know the names of the members of the patrol of L Company who discovered the bodies?  
A No, but some of them are now in the area.
- Q Were any photographs taken at the scene of the atrocities?  
A Yes. I remember T/5 JEPSON took several photographs of the scene of atrocities.
- Q Were you with him at the time?  
A Yes.
- Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 1 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13947) and ask you if you can identify it?  
A Yes, that is a photograph of a little girl lying face down among pineapple plants. I saw her lying that way.
- Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 2 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13957) and ask you if you can identify it?  
A That is a picture of the woman of about thirty-five years of age who had been bayoneted about three times on the chest. The body was found six feet off the trail.
- Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 3 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13951) and ask you if you can identify it?  
A This is the picture of the particular scene that I told you about previously where there was a mudhole at about the center of the barrio where we found approximately fifteen Filipino civilians composed of men, women and children who were bayoneted several times by the Japanese soldiers. This picture shows several of the bodies in the group of approximately fifteen. Behind the clump of bamboos the bodies of the rest were found. At about this point marked X and initialed by me, the bodies of the others were found.
- Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 4 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13945) and ask you if you can identify it?  
A This is the photograph taken of a scene which was adjacent to a stream running through the barrio. It is a clear representation of the mother that I saw, who was bayoneted several times. She was then lying face downward in an apparent attempt to protect her child who was also bayoneted several times. In the vicinity at about ten feet to the right of where this picture was taken lay two other victims who were also bayoneted several times.
- Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 5 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13948) and ask you if you can

identify it?

A This photograph depicts one of the victims, a man stripped of clothing who had been bayoneted several times in the upper chest region and also had his throat cut. This was taken in the small clearing in the center of the barrio.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 6 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13953) and ask you if you can identify it?

A Yes, this is a picture of the victim that I saw whose hands were tied by a rope behind his back and around his head who was bayoneted several times. This was found just off the trails.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 7 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13950) and ask you if you can identify it?

A Yes, this is a picture of the wife, I was told, of one of the Filipinos in the barrio, the men shown in Exhibit 6. She had been killed and bayoneted several times.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 8 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13949) and ask you if you can identify it?

A That is a picture of the man that I saw on a table beneath a nipa hut. He was bayoneted four or five times in the fact and also several places in his body. There were bludgeon marks and bruises all over his body. He was one of the first ones killed by the Japanese, I believe. I understand he is a relative of Felix ASTRONIMO.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 9 (also marked SWPA-Sig C-45-13955) and ask you if you can identify it?

A This a photograph of a boy about four years old who was bayoneted several times and had the flesh of his left thigh cut off. Evidently it was severed by some sharp knife. He was found in the pineapple grove approximately fifty feet from one of the huts. That is strong evidence of an act of cannibalism committed by the Japanese.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 10 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-13952) and ask you if you can identify it?

A This is a picture of a man who was found with his hands tied together. Evidently he must have been tied before being bayoneted to death.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 11 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-13956) and ask you if you can identify it?

A It is a picture of a victim that I saw whose hands and legs were tied with the rope around his neck. He was bayoneted several times.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 12 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-13946) and ask you if you can identify it?

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A It is a picture of a man that I saw who had been bayoneted several times, stripped to the waist and apparently was strangled by the rope which was tied around his neck,

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 13 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-13954) and ask you if you can identify it?

A It is a close-up picture of the child in the lower right-hand corner of Exhibit 3. I found the child lying face down in the mud of a creek bed. She was also bayoneted several times.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 14 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-13958 and ask you if you can identify it?

A It is the picture of a woman striving to protect her child. She had been bayoneted in the back several times. Underneath her body lies her child who had also been bayoneted to death.

Q When were the pictures marked Exhibits 1 to 14 taken?

A They were taken on 11 April 1945.

Q Did you see or notice any evidence of rape on any of these victims that you saw?

A No.

Q When you questioned and took the statements of the survivors of the atrocities, did you take any pictures of the said survivors?

A Yes. When I questioned them at the 1st Portable Surgical Hospital, I was accompanied by T/5 JEPSON who took the pictures of the survivors.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 15 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-14021) and ask you if you can identify it?

A This is a picture of MATEO ADES, 70 years of age, one of the victim-survivors. It was definitely established as evidenced by the declarations of eye-witnesses that MATEO ADES had been robbed and repeatedly stabbed and bayoneted.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 16 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-14022) and ask you if you can identify it?

A It is the picture of PATRICIO ADAD, 9 years old, one of the victims I have just mentioned above. He was the only surviving member of his family. He was also a victim of the bayoneting and it is my belief that this boy died from his wounds several days after.

Q I show you a picture which is marked Exhibit 17 (also marked SWPA-SigC-45-14020) and ask you if you can identify it?

A That is a picture of a girl that I saw by the name of AURORA VALENCIA, 16 years old, another of the survivors, who had been bayoneted several times on the upper right chest.

Q Do you know where and when these pictures were taken?

R E S T R I C T E D

A These pictures were taken in the ward of the 1st Portable Surgical Hospital on 16 April 1945.

Q Do you know of any other survivors?

A Yes, one of them was a minor a little girl whose name I cannot recall, who was included in the report I submitted through CIC channels. I believe he was a boy about seventeen years old. The report I have just referred to had all the names of the survivors, and their respective addresses.

Q Is there anything further that you know concerning atrocities, in this area?

A There is, Approximately three days before this incident occurred, several Filipinos were reported to have been massacred by the Japanese. This happened between the towns of Pakil and Paete, Laguna Province. At the time we did not conduct any investigation of the said atrocities. This incident happened approximately six miles south of Pakil.

Q Do you know the name of the person or persons who-told you about these atrocities?

A No, I don't recall but information on these atrocities could be had from the people of the place near Paete where the massacre actually took place. They were not the same atrocities I mentioned in the first part of my testimony. T/5 JEPSON has been transferred to 161st Signal Company, Unit 7, which is, I believe, presently located in Manila.

Re: Death of George Lewis

Sir:

This letter is addressed to you for the purpose of protesting the execution of George Lewis, which took place on your order at about 8:25 this morning. The facts are:

That about 6:55 a.m. Mr. Lewis was shot and wounded by a Japanese sentry, while passing into the Camp under a sawali fence which marks the boundary of the Camp. Your sentry refused to permit him medical attention, and at 8:25 a.m. you ordered him shot, and this was done notwithstanding the earnest protests of this Committee. Your staff also refused to permit him to receive the last rites for the Catholic Church before his execution.

This protest is predicated upon the following grounds:

1. You, as Commandant of the Camp, have no power to order the imposition of the death penalty upon any internee hereof, for any offense whatever.

We call your attention to Articles 60-67 of the Geneva Convention of 1929 which, soon after the outbreak of the present war, your Government agreed, with the Government of the United States, to follow in its treatment of civilian internees. Under these Articles only a Court may order the death penalty. The procedure is prescribed. In such cases notification must be given to the protecting power of the institution of the case; the right of the prisoner to defend himself is safeguarded, as well as his right to have counsel and to appeal; and these Articles expressly provide that no death penalty may be executed until three months after the protecting power is notified of the imposition thereof. You have disregarded all these provisions in ordering the execution of Mr. George Lewis this morning.

2. From no point of view was Mr. Lewis guilty of any offense involving the death penalty. At the worst, he could only be considered as in the act of escaping when first shot. The facts are to the contrary. He was actually returning to the Camp and hence was not an escaping prisoner. In any case, under Articles 47, 50, 51, and 52 of the Geneva Convention of 1929, an attempted escape is only an offense against discipline, and the punishment therefore may not exceed thirty days' arrest. To impose the death penalty for such a trivial offense, as you did upon Mr. Lewis this morning, constitutes a flagrant disregard of these provisions of the Convention, by which your Government has agreed with the Government of the United States to be bound in dealing with civilian internees.

RECORD OF EVENTS IN CONNECTION WITH THE SHOOTING AND EXECUTION  
OF GEORGE J. LOUIS

At 6:55 a.m. today, January 28, 1945, George J. Louis, American, age 27, while attempting to return to the Camp near the Animal Husbandry Building, was shot by a Japanese sentry. The sentry was one of a number of guards who had been on an all-night watch of the Animal Husbandry Building, since it was apparently evident to the Japanese that a number of persons had left the Camp on the preceding night through the sawali fence which bounds the Camp. At the time of the shooting the moon was still up, though shadows were cast over the area of the guards' patrol by the barracks buildings. It was not yet daylight. The guard on duty had heard a noise from the sawali fence some 15 feet from where he was standing. Uttering a short ejaculation, he raised his gun and fired immediately.

Mr. Gray, Secretary of the Committee, was a witness to the shooting but was refused permission to remain near the scene or to have the man removed to the Camp Hospital, though the movements of the victim indicated that he was still alive.

Messrs. Heichert, Watty, and Downs were summoned to the Commandant's Office at about 7:10 a.m. and were told by the Commandant, with no hesitation in arriving at such a decision, that the victim must be executed on the spot, since his condition appeared to be such that he could not be moved from the spot without expiring. All internees, including members of the Committee were ordered to their quarters.

Messrs. Heichert, Watty, Gray, Calhoun, and Cecil, with Mr. Downs, proceeded to the Commandant's Office to protest the Commandant's order, calling attention to the fact that the action contemplated was contrary to International law and to all humane standards, and that the Commandant would be held personally responsible. The Commandant at first refused to see any members of the Committee, but after numerous requests, finally appeared in his office.

Mr. Heichert made the following request of the Commandant: "We would like to make this statement from the Committee. The committee pretests the action of the sentry in shooting this man. If the man was trading at the fence, he should not be executed, and if he was returning to the Camp, he should not be executed. According to International law, he would only be shot if in the act of escaping. It is thought that you might not have made a full investigation of the case and we feel that you should do so before any hasty step is taken." The Commandant replied that the matter was being investigated, and continued: "However, as to whether or not he was trading, returning to the Camp, or attempting to escape, it is evident from the position of his body between the boundary fences that he has disregarded my order that the boundary fences should not be violated by internees."

There is no question about the facts in that respect. The original shooting was in accordance with my order to shoot on sight any person violating the boundaries. Dr. Yeshimura was at the scene, and there is no hope for the man's recovery. The orders to the soldiers are to shoot until they kill. Since the man fell immediately and made no sound it was thought that he was dead; since it is evident that he was not dead but has died since, the original sentence of execution must be carried out." The Commandant a number of times repeated his allegation that the wound was fatal, that Dr. Yeshimura had confirmed his supposition, and the Commandant asserted, supporting his words with motions, that the man had been shot in a vital spot through the center of the chest.

Mr. Reichert stated that the Committee would submit a formal protest of the shooting, and asked for a reconsideration of the Commandant's decision to have the man executed. Mr. Reichert added that if the Commandant persisted in his decision to have this execution carried out, regardless of whether the man was alive or dead, the Committee and the Camp consider it an act contrary to mankind, to rules of war, and to all standards of humanity. Mr. Reichert added that the Committee also wished to protest the action of the guard in shooting without a challenge, especially in view of the fact that there are a number of people in the Camp who are mentally unbalanced. The Commandant replied that as a normal practice the guards would challenge a person found near the boundaries, but where there is danger of escape the sentry can do nothing to shoot.

The Commandant stated that the execution must be gone through with, although he stated that the "dead man" would be removed to a clump of bamboo outside the Camp grounds. Mr. Reichert asked if the Committee could have the body, and if we should receive the body at the scene of the second shooting or if it would be taken to the Hospital. The Commandant stated that the body would be given to the Camp.

Meantime the man had been placed on an improvised stretcher by members of the Japanese garrison. Although all persons were ordered away from the scene, internees from nearby shanties and barracks reported that the wounded man was still moving and it was evident that he was still alive. He was taken outside the Camp and at exactly 8:25 a.m. a single shot was heard. The Chairman was notified that he could pick up the body at the scene of the execution. The Chairman, with four stretcher bearers, found the body in a clump of bamboo, still on the improvised stretcher. The victim had been shot through the forehead, apparently as he lay on the stretcher. The body was placed on a Hospital stretcher and taken to the Hospital. The statement of Dr. Nance, Camp Medical Director, regarding the condition of the body is as follows:

"I have examined the body of George J. Louis who was shot this morning by the Japanese. The body was picked up by our

stretcher bearers about 100 yards south of the fence along barracks ly. The body had been pierced by two bullets. One bullet had a wound of entrance above the outer border of the right clavicle (cellar bone) and an exit wound along the upper border of the corresponding scapula. This missile grazed the scapula but struck no vital organs --did not even enter other bullet entered the skull in the right frontal region and blew his brains out in the left occipital region. It would appear that this man was executed or given the coup de grace after having sustained a minor injury."

George J. Lewis was buried in the Camp burial ground at 11:00 a.m. today. This afternoon the Committee filed a formal pretest, copy of which is attached hereto and made a part of this official record.

SEIICHI AKITA, after having been reminded that he was still under oath, testified at Base "S" Steckade at Tabunok, Talisay, Cebu, Philippines, on 15 October 1945, as follows:

- Q. Did you know a Filipino family named PALICTE living at the Cebu Breeding Area, Cebu City, Cebu, P.I., in March, 1945?  
A. I do not know them by name, but the man was called "Dexter".
- Q. Do you have any information which you wish to tell us concerning the death of this Filipino family who lived in a house on the Breeding Area grounds just northwest of where you had been living, and the burning of their house on 26 March, 1945 just before the Americans came to Cebu City?  
A. Yes, I will voluntarily tell you what I know about the death of a Filipino family who lived just northwest of the house where I was living at that time.
- Q. What time of the day was it when these people were mistreated?  
A. It was on the 26th March 1945 but I do not know what time it was. But I believe it was at night because the men who did it had been ordered to return to our headquarters at noon but they did not come back until about 9:00 or 10:00 o'clock that night.
- Q. Where were you while this family was mistreated?  
A. I was in a fox-hole at the feet of the Hills just behind the Guadalupe church about 4 kilometers away.
- Q. Could you see the house where it took place from your fox-hole?  
A. I could not see it from where I was.
- Q. Then where did you get your information about this mistreatment?  
A. That same evening when the four men who did it came back to our unit I was in the same tent with them about 9:00 or 10:00 o'clock that night. They were proudly telling what had happened.
- Q. Do you know if anyone else overheard their conversation or was present?  
A. I do not know.
- Q. Did all four of them admit having taken part?  
A. I am not certain whether they all admitted taking part in the killing of this family but I do remember that all four of them admitted that they raped some of the girls in the family.
- Q. Did they admit having burned their home?  
A. Yes, they admitted having burned the house but they said that this was by order of T/Sgt YASOKICHI KORODA or else an order received from the MITSUI CORPS who was in-charge of the defense of this area.
- Q. Did these four men say that when they burned the house of this particular Filipino family, the people in the family were inside the house?  
A. I do not know if they were in the house when the house was burned but these four Japanese soldiers in talking among themselves said they had raped some girls in that house and that they had left no witness so I understood that there was no one else living who might have seen them do it. I also understood from what they said that they had burned the bodies because they said they left no evidence.
- Q. Did you ever hear anyone other than these four men admit having taken part in this particular rape and killing of the people and burning of the house?  
A. No other man was concerned in this matter because all the re

- of our troop had gone to our fortification in the mountains by Guadalupe. At noon of the 26th March our Unit left for this nearby mountain position leaving behind in Cebu City TANAKA and KATA. After we reached our new position, KBAYASHI, MIYAGE and YASUTAKE were sent back to assist TANAKA. All five of them returned to our position that night but KATO told me that he had not found TANAKA in Cebu City until just before they returned to the hills so I do not believe that KATO had anything to do with this matter. He took no part in the conversation.

- Q Where was this tent in which you overheard the conversation on the night of 28 March 1945 located?
- A Just in front of our trench near the mountain in Guadalupe.
- Q About how many kilometers is this from the house in which the family was living in Cebu City?
- A About four kilometers.
- Q Did these four men in the tent that night mention the name of the girls raped and killed?
- A According to my memory, they mentioned their names but I do not remember what they said it was.
- Q Do you remember any remarks they made about the girls?
- A According to my memory, they mentioned that one was beautiful and they also mentioned that there were several girls between thirteen and nineteen years old and they said that they each had raped all of them, it was at least two or more girls they raped.
- Q Did they describe the rape of these girls in so far as the use of force was concerned?
- A They said that the girls of 13 years old wept and was very pitiful so I assume that they used force.
- Q Did they use the word "rape" in referring to what they had done to these girls?
- A I did not hear the Japanese word for "rape" spoken.
- Q Did they say whether the girls screamed?
- A They said that the girl 13 years old screamed.
- Q Did they say whether they had threatened the girls with weapons?
- A I did not hear that they threatened them with weapons; what I did hear was they were carrying their weapons with them at that time.
- Q Did you hear them say whether the girls were held by members of the group while others raped them?
- A I did not hear them say that they employed force to hold the girls down but they did say that MIYAGE stood as sentinel outside or inside the house while the others raped the girls, and then MIYAGE came in and was the last one to rape the girls. I do not remember how many girls there were but I do remember that each of these four men admitted having raped each girl.
- Q What were the names of these four soldiers whose conversation you overheard?
- A Pvt. YASUTAKE, Pfc or Leading Corporal (I don't know which) ICHIRU TANAKA, Pfc or Leading Corporal MIYAGE, and Pfc. Seiichi Kobayashi. I don't know the ranks for sure because they mean almost the same thing.
- Q Where is YASUTAKE?
- A He died about one week after we left Cebu City in March, 1945, because of burns received in combat.

- Q Are these four men the same persons you described in your original statement of 16 October 1945?
- A Yes, sir.
- Q Were any other men mentioned in your statement of 16 October 1945 other than those you have just named in any way involved in this rape, killing or burning of the house or people you gave described in this statement?
- A No, only these I have mentioned were involved. The rest were in the mountain fortification with me at the time it happened.
- Q Do you know what happened to T/Sgt YASUKICHI KORODA?
- A He was killed by a mortar shell in the mountains.
- Q Who was the Commanding Officer of your unit on 26 March 1945?
- A The Capt. IBA I mentioned in my statement of 16 October 1945 was our commander until 25 March 1945. After that date we had a new Commanding Officer, 1st Lieut. MIZOBUCHI, first name unknown. He was our commander on 26 March 1945 when this event occurred.
- Q Was Lieut. MIZOBUCHI in command of your unit on the afternoon and evening when this event occurred?
- A Yes. I say this because our sergeant went to him for our orders. He was the Commanding Officer of these five men at that time.
- Q Where is Lieut. MIZOBUCHI now?
- A I do not know but I heard that he died in the mountains.
- Q Was Lieut. MIZOBUCHI on that date in any way under the control of Capt. IBA?
- A As I was only a private, I do not know for sure, but I think there was no connection.
- Q Did you ever return to the place where these girls were raped and house burned?
- A No, sir.
- Q Is the MIYAGE you mentioned in your previous statement on 16 October 1945 named TOSIMITSU MIYAGE?
- A I do not know his first name but I know he belonged to the IBA CORPS and he was shipped on the second shipment to Leyte from the Base "S" POW stockade.
- Q Has any force been used in obtaining this statement from you?
- A No force was used.
- Q Have any threats been used to obtain this statement?
- A No threats were made.
- Q Why have you made this statement?
- A Because the interpreter told me to tell the truth, because I am under oath, and because I have nothing to do with this matter mentioned in this statement.
- Q Has any promise of better treatment or immunity been made to you for your making this statement?
- A None. I have been made no promises and I tell this because I desire that criminals must be punished and those who are not criminals must be proved innocent.
- Q Have any of your Japanese camp officers caused you to make this statement?
- A No, sir.

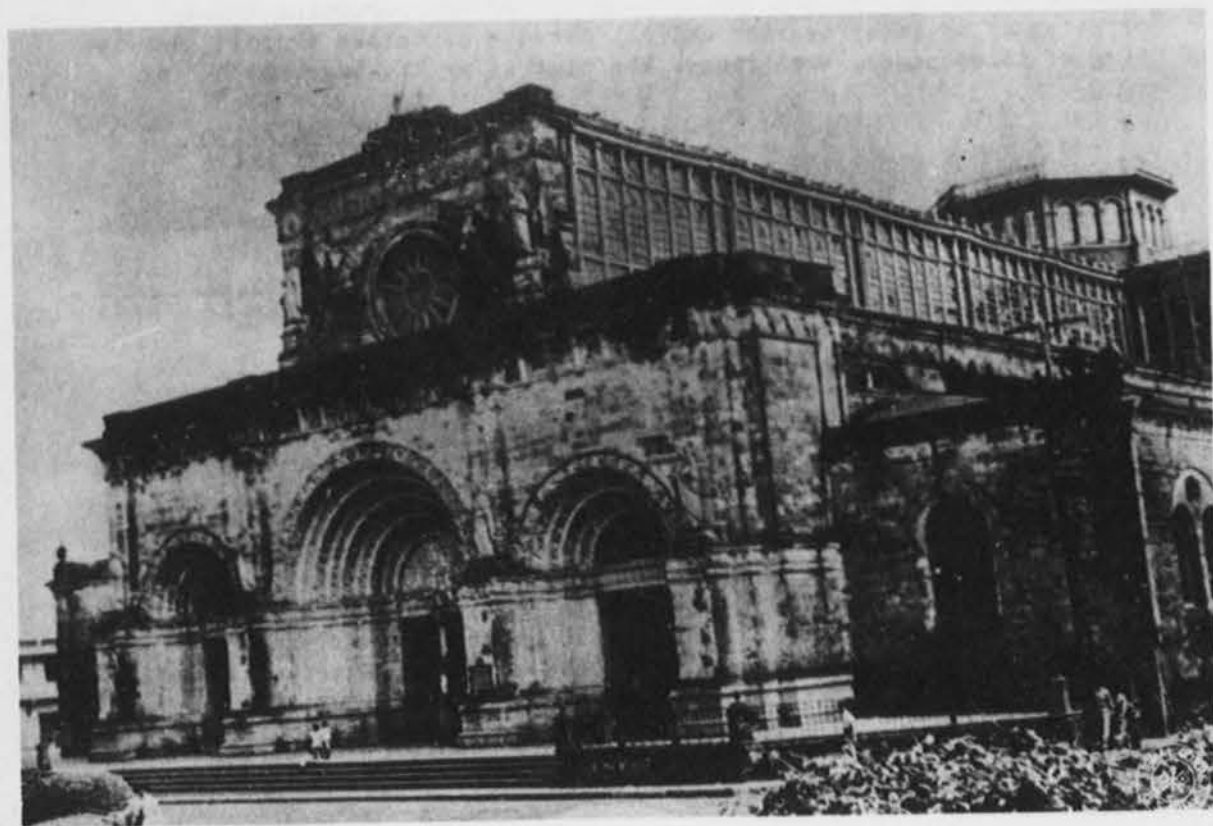

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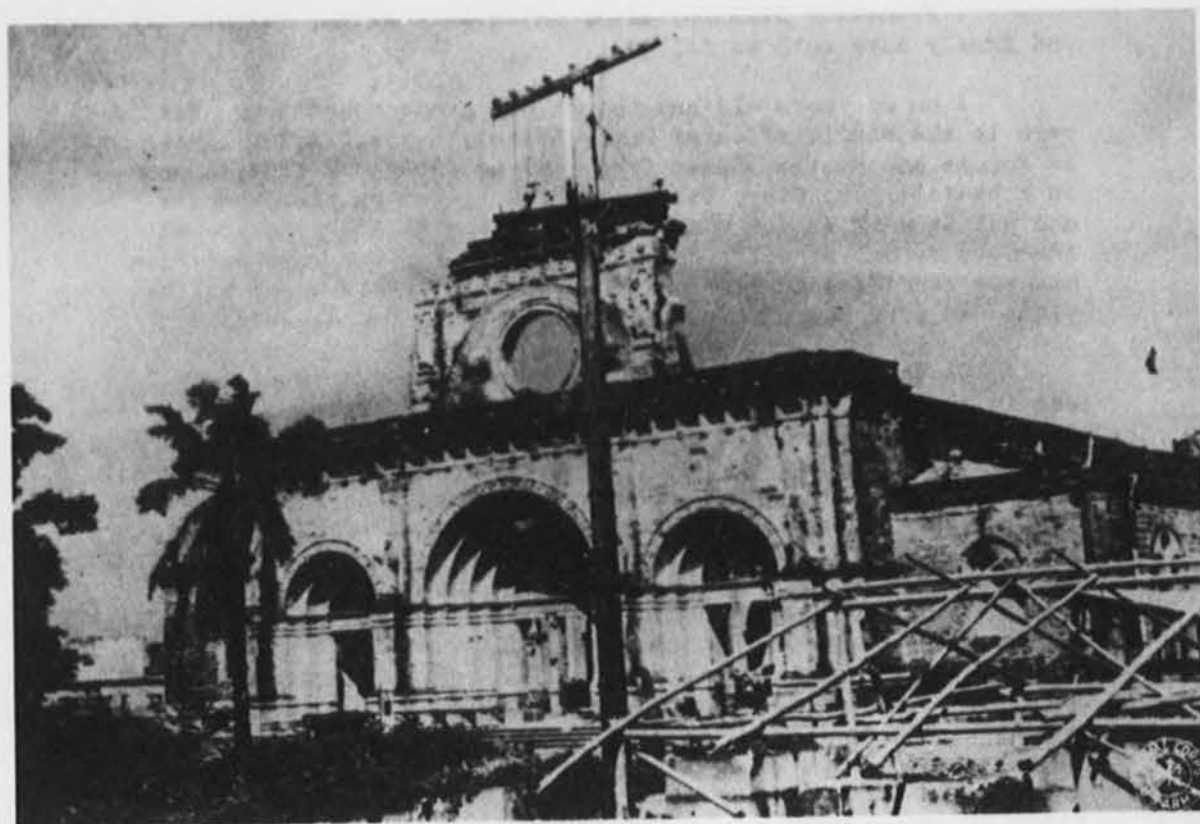

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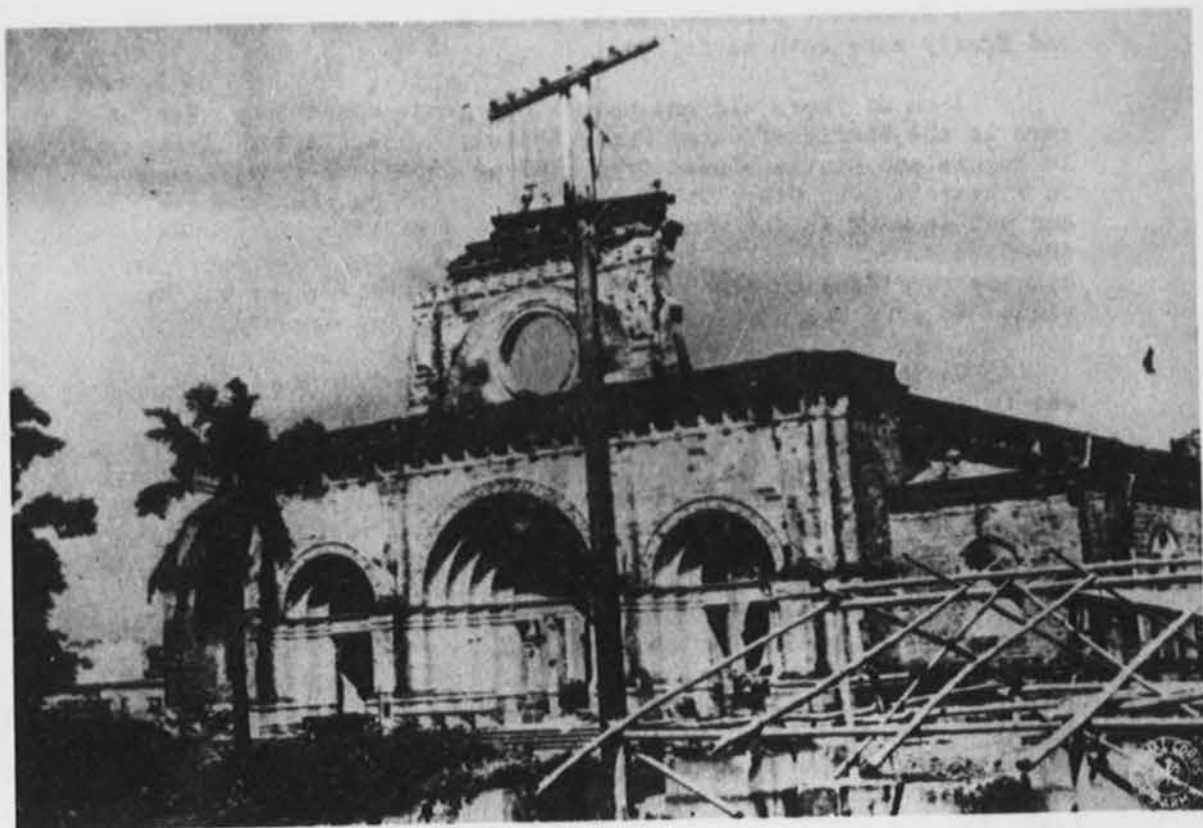

I Francisce HARRIDO, after being duly sworn, voluntarily and freely make oath as follows:

I am 20 years old and have a 6th grade education. Was born in the barrie of Caray Caray, Naval, Leyte. After living in Baguie and Manila, Luzen from 1939 to September 1944, I came on a boat to Cebu City, Cebu but was arrested by the Japanese and put to work at the Headquarters of the Military Police at the Cebu Normal School. Shertly thereafter I was released from nightly confinement there and allowed to live elsewhere but continued to work there as a Gardener, cook and laundry boy.

On the morning of March 26, 1945 about 7 or 8 o'clock I was in the kitchen assisting in the loading of rice, clothing, etc that was being evacuated by the Japanese to Guadalupe near the Capital Building in Cebu City and saw the Japanese kill one Filipino prisoner and one American prisoner. The Filipino was killed first and immediately thereafter they brought the American from the building to a foxhole in the yard some 75 yards from where I was working. The American was made to bend over near the foxhole with his hands tied behind him while a Japanese Military Police Sergeant by the name of Higasi struck him across the back of the neck with a saber. The body fell into the foxhole and a Japanese 2nd Lieutenant Sakai shot him one time with a pistol. At this point we had finished loading the rice and clothing and, while another boy hauled it around to the front gate, I went thru the main building and saw two or three Filipines and one American prisoner on the perch being guarded by a Japanese seldier. The American soldier had an injured leg which I understood was a wound received at the time he was captured by the Japanese, and he was standing with his arms around the neck of one of the Filipines. I proceeded on to Guadalupe and did not witness more of the killing although at the time I left they were still taking Filipines out in the yard to be executed. There was much excitement and confusion due to the many planes of the Americans flying overhead and from the American shelling and it is difficult to remember everything that happened or the exact time.

I returned to the Normal building about 1 o'clock P.M. of the same day at the instructions of the Japanese as they needed me to help load other things to be carried away. When I had reached a point some 75 yards from the foxhole where I had seen the one American killed, I saw one of the American soldiers sitting on the ground near the foxhole looking at the planes in the sky. I hollered to him to crawl down in the foxhole as if he were dead because the Japanese would be returning. He appeared to be very weak and unable to turn his head in my direction but with his hands and feet turned his entire body around so as to be facing me. He motioned something to me as if wanting me to bring him water but I told him I was afraid the Japanese would see me. I did not go closer than 75 yards to him but am confident that he was the American that had been wounded in the leg. In addition to having seen him on the perch with his arm around the Filipino. I had carried food three times to the two Americans. Fearing that the Japanese might see me talking to the American, I ran home.

The following morning around 11 o'clock on the 27th, I returned to the Normal for the purpose of trying to get rice that might have been left by the Japanese. I again saw the American at the same location but he was attempting to waive at the planes overhead and did not seem to hear me when I again yelled for him to lie in the foxhole so that the Japs wouldn't see him. I did not see any Japanese around at the time but buildings and gas dumps were burning all around nearby and I was still afraid I might be seen by the Japanese if I helped him. I then went into the main building and found that there was rice, in a room and then went on to the front gate where I met two Japanese, one of which was Higasi who had executed the other American on the previous morning. Being given permission by them to get the rice, I went to get two companions one of which was Marcus Arpen. Upon returning to the Normal and getting the rice, we went to a point near the kitchen to get a cart with which to move the rice to our home and, while getting the cart, I noticed Higasi and the other Japanese carrying wood over toward the foxhole where the American had been sitting and pile it into the foxhole. They even took chairs over there and broke them up and placed them in the foxhole. The American was not seen by me at this time so I believe Higasi and the other Japanese had found him and thrown him either dead or alive into the foxhole.

Instead of accompanying my companions to our home with the rice, I went around the road to a point where I could see the location of the foxhole and saw the two Japanese pour gasoline into the foxhole and light it. A huge fire then burned in the foxhole. I then went home and knew nothing else about what happened to the bodies of the Americans.

The two Americans had been prisoners about a week before they were executed and I understand that they were flyers that had been shot down. I estimate it to have been some 20 or 30 minutes between the time I last saw the American and the time I saw the Japanese carrying wood to the foxhole.
