## RFID to be installed at key roads in Myanmar

Ministry of Transport and Communications is working to launch radio frequency identification (RFID) system to control unlicensed vehicles and motorbikes.

“The RFID system will be installed at trunk roads and key locations,” said director-general U Zaw Min Oo of Road Transport Administration Department.

The system will be implemented with the aim of holding the perpetrators in hit-and-run crimes accountable, and control unlicensed vehicles and motorbikes.

The ministry will sign contract with the consultant company Moon Engineering Joint Venture Co Ltd this month.

According to the program, RFID sticker or tag will be affixed to all the licensed vehicles and motorbikes across the country in a set period. Then, RFID readers and antennas will be installed at junctions and central points of major towns and cities, so that they can detect any unlicensed motored vehicles.

## Scholars share knowledge on teaching methods

## More school buses on Yangon roads

School buses will ferry students to downtown schools in Yangon, apart from the 12 schools that already have the school bus system, said Yangon Region Transport Authority (YRTA).

Schools in downtown received notice about the student transport program, and at the initial stage the number of students, routes and distances will be discussed.

“We are going to increase the number of school buses. We will hold talks with the schools that asked for school buses. All sectors including the routes and the distance will be taken into account,” said U Aung Nyi Nyi Maw, managing director of Yangon Region Transport Authority.

Previously, 92 school buses were transporting 1876 students of 12 schools, and now 98 are shuttling 1,897 schoolchildren.

Currently, the buses are commuting the students of Yankin TTC, Kamayut TTC, Thingangyun TTC, BEHS 2 of Mayangon, BEHS 1 of Latha, BEHS 2 of Latha, BEHS 1 of Sanchaung, BEPS 6 of North Okkalapa, BEHS 8 of North Okkalapa, BEHS 2 of North Okkalapa, BEPS 46 of Shwepaukkan and, BEPS 6 of Shwepaukkan.

Proper training including first aid courses were given to both male and female drivers of the buses to provide better services.
