Precis of Evidence: The prosecution, by documentary evidence, alleged that, early in 1944, a party of Australian servicemen was engaged in reconnaissance work in North Borneo. Three members of the party were captured by the Japanese. When questioned all stated that they were australian soldiers and they were in fact, wearing Australian Army uniforms and openly carrying arms. The PW were tried by a Japanese military court for espionage and executed. The accused knew this to be contrary to International law and that the trial held was a mockery.

The Defence contended that the trial was held in accordance with Japanese Military Law and that the convening officer and the members the Court were members of a properly constituted Japanese Military Court with powers to try the Australians as spies.
